The ongoing trial of Rios Montt represents the first time a national court has tried a former head of state for genocide and war crimes. Guatemala's former dictator Rios Montt and his military intelligence chief, Jose Mauricio Rodriguez, have been on trial since March for the deaths of some 1700 Maya-Ixil people during the 1982-83 period, when Rios Montt was head of state and defense minister, and the army waged a brutal counterinsurgency campaign in the area. The trial has featured hundreds of eyewitnesses, dozens of national and foreign experts, and a dizzying array of procedural twists and turns. A verdict is expected shortly.

Guatemala's chief prosecutor, Claudia Paz y Paz Bailey, will explain the trial's importance from her perspective, and talk about next steps. Trial observers Naomi Roht-Arriaza and Jo-Marie Burt, both with extensive experience with Latin American human rights-related trials, will discuss the course, outcome and meanings of the trial. In particular, they will explore the lessons learned for national courts dealing with international crimes by still-powerful defendants.
